LONG-STANDING PARTNER FOR MORE THAN 600 YEARS

Heidelberg University Library is one of the oldest academic libraries in the German-speaking region, mentioned for the first time in a document from 1396. Otto-Henry (1502–1559), prince elector of the Palatinate, brought together selected collections of books, which laid the foundation for the famous Bibliotheca Palatina (»Palatinate library«) of Heidelberg. After the library was transported to Rome during the Thirty Years War, Heidelberg's University Library rose again in the 19th century. Essential for its development was the reorganisation of the University as well as the acquisition of the libraries from the secularized Abbeys Salem and Petershausen.

In 1888 the library's most famous manuscript, the Codex Manesse (»Great Heidelberg Songbook«), was returned to Heidelberg. Written and illustrated in Zürich during the early 14th century, the Codex Manesse is the single most comprehensive collection of Middle High German courtly love songs.

The new building of the University Library was opened in 1905 under the supervision of the head librarian Karl Zangemeister (1837–1902). The architectural design by Joseph Durm (1837–1919) still shapes the use of the University Library to the present day.



Looking back on 600 years of tradition, Heidelberg University Library provides the University and its region with a modern library service.
